2019 Census

United Methodist Women 2019 Membership Census Deadline: March 30, 2020



It is time again to stand and be counted. Whether your United Methodist Women's group is large or small, please go to

https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/ look for the green box and fill in the census questions at the bottom of the page. Scroll down, and start with your church's zip code, choose your church from the list, and many of the answers will fill in automatically. Before you start, have in hand your membership count at the end of 2019 (whether small or large), and the name and contact information for your unit's president. Don't forget

to press SUBMIT at the end of the census, to make sure it gets recorded. Do it today, before you forget! If there is not a president in your group, find someone else to go on-line and fill out the form. You will be glad you did after all our Minnesota numbers are reported and tallied.

The first part of the census website gives the results of the 2018 census. This gave the National United Methodist Women ideas of what the needs are of UMW groups around the country. Reading through the information might give you tips of how to grow your own unit.

Legacy Builders Update

During the 150th anniversary year of United Methodist women, Minnesota UMW members stepped up! The 2019 Legacy Fund giving totals have not been announced, and we will report them as soon as we know. I believe that when those numbers arrive, they will show that since 2015, Minnesota has contributed \$100,000 toward the \$60 million national goal for the Legacy Fund. (I could be wrong, of course; we'll see!) Thank you, thank you, thank you for your giving as individuals, as circles and as units. Thank you for honoring other women for their service to women, children and youth through a Legacy gift.

Nationally, we seem to be on track to be at the half-way point in meeting the goal for the Legacy Fund. That means our work is not yet done. I encourage you to continue your generous giving — on the March 23 Day of Giving, as part of your UMW budget, through a major gift or by naming The

Legacy Fund as a beneficiary in your will or insurance policy.

Another way to support the Legacy Fund is to become a Legacy Builder, pledging to contribute \$18.69 monthly (or more). You can also choose to make gifts on a quarterly, semi-annual or annual basis. It is a way for members to participate in a sustainable and regular way of giving to the campaign that moves us closer to the \$60 million goal.

It has been an honor to serve as the Minnesota Legacy Liaison for the past five years. I've enjoyed the conversations we've had and the presentations and skits. I'm stepping down, and Sandy Meyer is now the Legacy Liaison. You can contact her at presmnumw@gmail.com. She has pins, contribution

2019 was a monumental year for United Methodist Women, the Church and our nation. It has been a year that's cried aloud: "Women still need to organize for mission!" If the past 150 years have taught us anything, it's that women ORGANIZED FOR MISSION are essential for the Church to BE the Church. It is abundantly clear that God continues to look to women committed to turning their faith, hope, and love into action on behalf of women, children and youth along with neighbors on hard times and who have been pushed aside. We are being called to organize for mission FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS. We are here to continue the mission regardless of what decisions are made in the wider church.

The Legacy Fund is a National UMW Endowment Campaign celebrating the legacy of the courageous women who founded this mission movement in 1869 (150 years ago), as well as the legacy that today's members will leave for future generations of United Methodist women who will carry the mission of faith, hope, love in action forward for years to come.

UMW is innovating programs to respond to the changing times and needs of current members and the many women who will be joining this mission journey. Spiritual growth, leadership development, transformative education alongside service and advocacy are part of our identity as United Methodist Women. Increasingly, you'll be experiencing these core values integrated into all of our programs to enhance membership as we prepare for mission action.

You impact God's world for good turning your faith, hope, and love into action through your **Mission Giving**. This **quadrennium**, United Methodist Women has allocated more than \$30 million for member development programs, support for more than 90 National Mission Institutions and projects, and international ministries and scholarships, as well as continued work on the priority issues.

In 2018 alone, National Mission Institutions that are community centers and residential programs reported serving 205,042 persons. Several of the National Mission Institutions in the southern U.S. border towns are serving the immigrant women, children and families seeking asylum in the United States when they're released from the detention facilities. Several National Mission Institutions located in other parts of the country are exploring certification to house some of the children who've been separated from their families until they can be reunited.

Your Mission Giving matters in the United States and internationally supporting mission partners in nearly 100 countries this quadrennium. The

international presence is driven by the work of our Regional Missionaries who partner with Methodist and United Methodist Women organizations in 21 African countries, 24 annual conferences of the Philippines, 12 countries in the Caribbean, and 10 countries of Latin America, through program and mission leadership.

Education continues to be important as we focused on member education and actions surrounding our priorities of A Living Wage, Climate Justice, Ending the School to Prison Pipeline, and Maternal and Child Health through letter writing campaigns and workshops. Thank you to all in Minnesota who sent postcards to your legislators in support of funding for the Maternal Mortality and Morbidity Review Board.

Also, in 2018, 24 United Methodist Women members were consecrated from 19 conferences as deaconesses. Deaconess Home Missioners are laywomen and men with a passion for God and a commitment to full-time ministry in service vocations such as parish nursing, social services, photojournalism and Christian education. In Minnesota, we currently have 4 Deaconesses and 3 candidates for Deaconess Home Missioner.

United Methodist Women prepares women for leadership for such a time as this as many members boldly stepped up to leadership this year throwing their hats into the ring as candidates for the 2020 General Conference of the United Methodist Church.

United Methodist Women will be bringing four pieces of legislation to the 2020 General Conference for adoption:

- Children's Sabbath. Adds the third Sunday in October to the church calendar as the United Methodist Church's U.S. observance of Children's Sabbath.
- The Girl Child. Calls the church to engage in advocacy to rectify conditions that limit girls from reaching their fullest potential in healthy environments.

- The Status of Women: Towards Realizing
 Human Rights for All Women. Calls on the
 church to work for women's global equality
 in education, health, violence against
 women, etc.
- Voter Rights Protection in the U.S. Calls attention to the disproportionate impact of voter suppression and for all communities to have access to full and equitable rights in the voting polls.

Once again, quoting Rev. Javier Viera:

"In this broken and fractured world, has there ever been a more important time for you to do the work and to live the mission you've been called to? I don't think so. We need you right now, we need your message of empowerment and healing, of grit and resilience, of transformation and liberation, of faith, hope and love."

Thank you, United Methodist Women, for all that you do. For turning faith, hope, and love into action on behalf of women, children, and youth today. Tell your story.

This series of brief essays, reflections and frequently asked questions provides resources for going deeper into United Methodist Women's <u>Living Wage for All Campaign</u>.


As women of faith, we know that God promised us abundant life. As women of action, we work to



Based off of the popular Implicit Bias Workbook, GCORR has created an online course for anyone who is interested in learning and teaching others about implicit bias.

We invite pastors, teachers, and anyone who is interested in learning and teaching others about implicit bias to take this free on-demand online course. This course is designed for you to take at your own pace and includes bonus content specifically for preachers.

The learning engagements included in each section allow for individual work, group work, and optional sermon preparation. All of the learning engagements recognize and lift up the reality that context is known best by those on the ground. Thus, while this course provides multiple entry points for learning about, thinking through, and transforming action regarding implicit bias, it does not contextualize the information for you. *Implicit Bias:* What We Don't Think We Think honors the contextual wisdom that you and others will bring to this material. Each exercise is an invitation to the sacred journey of discovering with your church and community how God is leading you to use this material faithfully within your context. Keynote Speaker - Most Reverend Archbishop Bernard Hebda

Archbishop Hebda's commitment to service and justice has been a key component of his ministry, spanning parish priesthood on the south side of Pittsburgh; Director of the Newman Center at Slippery Rock University; Pontifical Council for Legislative Texts at the Vatican; and Bishop and Archbishop roles in the Diocese of Gaylord, Michigan, and the Archdioceses of Newark and St. Paul and Minneapolis.

Transportation Options:

With a BA from Harvard in Political Science and a law degree from Columbia University, legal experience at an international law firm based in Pittsburgh, and years of seeing the impact of policy decisions on individuals and families, Archbishop Hebda is a strong advocate for justice and human dignity.

Theme: Serving the Common Good Our 2020 Day on the Hill theme comes from a quotation from Pope Francis: "Politics [...] is one of the highest forms of charity, because it serves the common good."

In 2020, hundreds of people of faith will come together to serve the common good!

Join faithful advocates from across the state on April 1, 2020 to reflect on why we make our voices heard, to plan for continued actions in our home communities, and to advocate for meaningful change in the state of Minnesota.

Becoming a Deaconess or Home Missioner

Deaconesses and home missioners are approved through a process established by United Methodist Women, consecrated and commissioned by a bishop at settings approved by the board of directors of United Methodist Women. They shall have a continuing relationship to The United Methodist Church through United Methodist Women.

Deaconesses and home missioners are available for service with any agency or program of The United Methodist Church. Deaconesses and home missioners may also serve in United Methodist Church agencies or programs, provided that approval is given by United Methodist Women in consultation with the bishop in the receiving area. (¶1913.4, 2016 Book of Discipline)

Discernment Events for Deaconesses and Home Missioner Ministry

During a period of discernment, we listen for the call of God on our lives. The Deaconess-Home Missioner Discernment event is an opportunity to explore God's call to vocational ministry as a Deaconess or Home Missioner of The United



Methodist Church. During these 2-3 days we explore scripture, hear and share call stories, and learn what it takes to be in relationship as a Deaconess or Home Missioner, all in a retreat-like setting.

Discernment Events are held at various times and locations throughout the year (see below). Space is limited.
